The integrity of the investigative process




The complexities and nuances of law that allow police officers to use force; sometimes lethal force; when certain conditions exist

Provision of information to the persons involved


Intense media scrutiny

The tendency to be wary of oversight, particularly when it comes from the outside




There appeared to be, on the part of certain of the police witnesses and certain police associations, an almost Pavlovian reaction against a civilian agency investigating the conduct of police officers

in carrying out their duties and against the idea that such an agency could conduct an investigation which would be fair to police officers.

This is particularly surprising when the statistics given in evidence establish that in about 97% of the cases, the investigation exonerates the subject police officer.
